



A little over an hour after they arrived at the Abbey to be married, the couple emerged on a red carpet and onto the streets and into a horsedrawn carriage, heading toward Buckingham Palace.

On a more solemn note, May 1st was the date President Barack Obama announced the assassination of Osama bin Laden. The United States conducted an operation that killed bin Laden, the terrorist responsible

for the murder of thousands of innocent men, women, and children. It was not long before this became international Fukushima Dainews across the world.

The Amanda Knox trial also

caused a stir in homes around the world. Knox was an American college student from Seattle (Nabil K. Mark/Centre Daily Times/MCT) on a semester



Sollecito were convicted of the murder. On October 3rd of this year, both Knox and her boyfriend were cleared in the death of 21-year-old woman.

Lastly, how could anyone forget the horrendous series of events that devastated Japan this March? The country was first struck with an astounding 9.0 magnitude earthquake leaving countless dead, wounded, and miss-

ing. To make things worse, they were shortly followed by a massive tsunami that crossed the length of Japan's northeast coastline. Lastly, as if all that was not enough,

around 80,000 residents had to evacuate their homes due to radiation threats from the

ichi nuclear power plant. This was one of the worst nuclear disasters in the history of the world.

This was also a very newsworthy and eventful year for the United States as well. Some major highlights include the death of Steve Jobs, the shooting of the Arizona representative, plus

the Casey Anthony trial. Steve Jobs, who founded

State scandal, and the earthquake.

The university fired the longtime coach after he apparently was criticized for failing to contact the authorities in 2002 after learning that his assistant coach, Jerry Sandusky, sexually assaulted a young boy. They did this in hopes of mending the damage being done to the university's reputation.

The most powerful earthquake to strike the East Coast in 67 years shook buildings and rattled people from Georgia to Canada. On August 23rd Many places in New York and parts of the White House, Capitol and Pentagon were evacuated. The quake even shook people in Berwick.

the unbeatable record is introduced as Kenny Bostick, played by actor Owen Wilson.


As the movie continues to move forward,



if anyone can beat them both.


