

President Joe Biden's first 30 days in office

Joe Biden enacted a record number of executive orders and actions within his first thirty days as the newly inaugurated President of the United States. After swearing an oath to uphold the Constitution and protect the US against foreign and domestic threats, President Biden immediately went to work in the Oval Office, revoking many Trump era policies. Topics for his actions include from immigration, climate change, COVID-19, and cultural issues.

President Biden signed over 30 executive orders and actions within his first week in office, setting a record. Many of his orders and actions, per usual, are lauded by his supporters though decried by his detractors.

One of the first actions he took included sending immigration reform to Congress that set up a pathway to citizenship for illegal

aliens residing within the country after an eight-year process. Biden expanded on his perspective on immigration through further executive orders and actions that directly contradict policies former President Donald Trump signed into law. One of the more consequential of those reversed policies incorporates illegal aliens into the 2020 Census, which Trump vehemently opposed. Biden also ended the national emergency the 45th President declared in order to divert cash to fund the wall on the US-Mexico border. Biden's immigration reform does not end there, however. He promised to end Trump's travel ban on countries that are hubs and sponsors of terrorism. More recently, on February 4th, Biden signed an executive order directly targeting more Trump immigration policies, as well as greatly expanding refugee programs. Biden's focus

President Biden professed a need to hone in on climate change. He accomplished this goal in a variety of ways. Arguably the most controversial of these involves revoking the permit for the Keystone Pipeline. One would assume only workers on this project and conservatives would become enraged over this action, though Canada also announced its displeasure, as the northly neighbor relied on this pipeline. The President rejoined the Paris Climate Accords as well after Trump pulled the US out in 2017, citing its economic costs greatly outweigh any environmental benefit. Biden signed several executive orders targeting climate change in many different ways, such as one that diverted \$30 billion from farmers towards climate change purposes. In addition to this, Biden's environmental plan for the future spans many years past his term. As part of the pitch,

Biden's plan comprises of phasing out all oil, natural gas, and coal as electricity sources by as early as 2035. Furthermore, this plan prevents the government from purchasing or extending any gas or oil leases on federal property. Biden's actions do not end with these two topics, though. He took action regarding many coronavirus and cultural issues.

The 46th President stressed the need to wear masks by mandating all federal workers to wear one on government property. Moreover, Biden authorized the TSA to fine any individual that refuses to wear a mask within their jurisdiction. Additionally, the President ensured vaccinations would continue as quickly as possible following the deaths of hundreds of thousands. However, Biden did not forget the cultural side of issues. He reversed Trump's ban on transgenders in the military, mandated government employees abide by the Supreme Court decision that the Civil Rights Act of 1964 encompasses transgenders and denounced via an executive order any and all discrimination. Regarding abortion, Biden reversed a policy which prevented tax dollars from going to international organizations that provide other countries with abortion programs, as well as revoking many executive orders and actions Trump made in order to limit access to abortion.

President Biden promised change going forward in America, and after removing much of former President Donald Trump's policies, he certainly accomplished this goal. Many detest the current President's actions, just as many praise them. If the first thirty days are a precursor, Biden will enact many more policies, actions, and laws that may alter America's position in the world and how other countries perceive the United States.

Coronavirus troubling many in meat industry

COVID-19 has brought many challenges throughout 2020. It forced cities to be shut down, schools to go virtual, businesses to close, and endless restrictions. In addition to this, the virus has affected the meat industry, a complex that determines much of what individuals purchase and consume in terms of meat.

In general, most people get their meat from the grocery store. Most of the meat products from grocery stores are produced by commercial farms. These farms carry hundreds to thousands of

animals in mostly confined areas that work systematically and are on a very strict time schedule. Most of the time, animals raised for meat are arranged in pens according to size. Once the oldest animals have been sent for processing, the animals are all shifted to the next age pen and younger animals are brought in. This cycle continues almost flawlessly, where new animals are brought in and the old ones are sent out. However, due to COVID-19

However, due to COVID-19 regulations and restrictions, this cycle broke. Commercial sized butchers were getting shut down due to workers contracting the coronavi-

rus, thereby backing up the production chain. The United States Department Of Agriculture, (USDA), requires a certified inspector to oversee the butchering process in order for the product to be sold in cuts. This left the commercial farms with no place to send their older animals, and nowhere to put the young ones. Some farm owners tried to send animals to smaller, USDA inspected butchers, however this was not effective due to the large amount of animals and the small size of the butchers. Because of this backup, older animals were being euthanized in order to create room

for younger ones.

Due to this process, the meat found in grocery stores was in short supply. So how does this affect consumers? The meat products that filled the shelves were no longer American products, but imported meat from China and New Zealand. Due to the USDA being only based in the U.S, how do we know how this meat is handled? What are we actually consuming?

This is why it is extremely important to know the exact source of your food. Know the answers to where it is from, how it is raised, and the mission of the farmer. Eating locally grown products of any kind will almost always be the better option. Most small farms process less, and provide a fresher, healthier product filled with nutrition simply from the product with nothing else added. They also care for animals more personally and allow them to live a life where they are raised with enough space, unlike most commercial farms.

It is incredibly important for you to know where your food is coming from in order to know exactly what you are eating. As the old saying goes, you are what you eat. Do you really know what you are?

What do Berwick's students think of global warming?

With the growing concerns and controversy involved with global warming, students and staff at the Berwick Area High School were asked for their opinions on the subject, such as their personal fear of its effects on the economy and environment.

When asked a basic definition of the phenomenon, ecology teacher Mike Rochford defines global warming as, "an increasing temperature on the Earth`s surface."

Student Zackary Bedwell elaborates on this definition, saying that global warming is, "where greenhouse gases spread by pollution reflects the sun's radiation on to the Earth in the atmosphere, and causes an overtime increase in heat. This is called the greenhouse effect."

Furthermore, Bedwell declares that the main causes of global warming are the use of, "power plants, factories, transportation, and fracking."

Similarly, junior Zachary Conrad lists, "Greenhouse gas emissions, carbon emissions, and holes in the ozone layer," due to their contributions to air quality.

However, student Andon James holds an opposing view. He says, "Global warming is mostly caused by the natural pattern of the planets motion, as we all know the earth will get slowly hotter and colder over the course of many years." Rochford agrees, explaining that although burning fossil fuels may contribute to global warming, it is only a small amount.

Some students show clear worry for the possible effects global warming may have in the future. Senior Dakota Welch expresses his disapproval by explaining the effects of the rising sea levels across the world due to this issue, saying, "When the Earth warms, ice caps melt."

He further goes on to explain, "That is enough water to flood coastal and highly populated cities in places such as Shanghai, Hong Kong, and almost, if not all, the country of Japan. Plus, a majority, if not all of South Korea, many US cities including most of Florida, and a ton of European cities." These floods could result in millions of deaths across the world along with greater debt for many countries.

Student Arianna Morris also displays concern for the possible effects global warming could have in the future. With increasing temperatures and melting ice caps, she says many animals, especially those in cold habitats, may become endangered and go extinct. Morris then goes on to explain that global warming may ruin biodiversity, which is vital to the farming industry.

Although some students express mounting fear for the subject, a couple individuals do not believe global warming to be much of an issue. Rochford and James both agree that global warming is "naturally caused" and is not something the country should worry about.

Rochford assures, "There are numerous pieces of evidence from Earth's past that indicate times of warming and cooling of the planet throughout history of the Earth." Just as Rochford suggests, warm periods have occurred through the Earth's history with greater temperatures than today in a shorter span of time. Examples include the Roman Warm Period, the Minoan Warm Period, and the Medieval Warm Period.

While not everyone believes global warming is an issue, all the participants recognize possible long-term effects it could have on the environment. Bedwell says that global warming could cause many animals to go extinct, which will, "mess up the food chain."

James, in another perspective, says that climate change could make it harder for farmers to rely on weather patterns to grow crops, which may also affect the economy.

Yes, global warming can affect both the environment and the economy. "We are already seeing effects [in the economy] from [global warming] because of the loss of jobs related to fossil fuels." Rochford states.

Similarly, Conrad declares that "rash actions taken by politicians to fight global warming" will not only harm the economy in the US by taking away jobs, but it will also be, "adding even more reliance on other countries."

Welch, however, sees the possible damage the debatable issue can cause differently. He explains that global warming and its contribution to the rising sea levels and forest fires may cause the destruction of "millions of homes" which would cost, "trillions of dollars in damage worldwide,"overflowing the market and causing a state of chaos for the economies of many countries.

Furthermore, whether or not global warming is a big enough issue to shut down fracking and factory related businesses remains one of the biggest controversies in politics and the science community. Fracking is when high pressure water is shot into the ground where deposits of oil or natural gas is located in order to extract the fossil fuels. Due to this, fracking is hotly debated even presidentially.

In continuation to his previous statements, Welch says that shutting down factories and fracking in combat of global warming would be worth the job sacrifices because "The deaths of hundreds of millions and even billions of lives cannot be justified by losing maybe a few ten thousand jobs."

Morris has a similar opinion, stating that although she agrees in closing these businesses, "I do not agree with immediate elimination of jobs because this hurts the economy."

Bedwell, on expansion of these ideas, offers a solution: "Companies can be used to support other forms of energy to produce goods, and workers can be laid off with the help of the government and supporters," he says, "Then, companies over time can decrease the number of workers` occupations to not take away jobs, but to transition into the new age of energy."

On the other hand, Rochford believes that there is no need for change or a solution, because the use of fossil fuels is, "only a small reason as to why temperatures increase."

Plus, Conrad believes that eliminating fracking and factory jobs is not worth the fight since, "millions of people in the United States will lose their jobs." On top of his main point, Conrad points out that these jobs are, "too crucial to the economy," and taking them away from people and companies will have too large an impact financially.

Yet, despite the constant controversy and disagreement of whether global warming should be tackled- let alone how it should be tackled- students at have faith in the way their generation will handle the issue in the future.

James voices his confidence in the future leaders of his generation and their abilities to help "this glorious county and help solve some problems" involved with global warming. As to how the future generations can help slow global warming, many of the survey participants suggest harmless ways to help the environment.

For instance, Morris says, "As a population, we can convince each other to do better and change the way we live. Individually we can clean up the world around ourselves and donate to worthy causes."

Welch, building off the same idea, says, "I personally try and help by reusing things as much as I possibly can before recycling them."

To take this idea a step further, Welch adds, "The government could mandate recycling and put more restrictions on factory and car pollution, as well as creating a whole field dedicated to just the environment [to help with the lost jobs of fracking and factories] and stopping the spread of more pollution."

"[I'm] not sure we can have a large impact on the slowing of global warming, but we can slowly move away from fossil fuels. We need to do this anyway due to the fact that they are something that will run out in the future," Rochford inputs.

While the world is currently already seeing the effects of climate change due to the loss of jobs and increasing temperatures, each student agrees that it will be a very long time until the country sees serious and noticeable effects from the subject.

However, what shows importance is that even with disagreement, the students at the high school remain hopeful for their generation. They believe that they will find ways to combat the controversy and issues surrounding global warming and climate change. They believe that their generation will change the world.







World of Warcraft wows with new expansion Shadowlands

World of Warcraft: Shadowlands is a massively multiplayer online roleplaying game (MMORPG). It has a vast player base of exactly 4.88 million players. The game is better to play with friends, family, or just other people in the game, but it can be played solo. It has a perfect artistic theme with many very talented artists in the company, Blizzard Entertainment. The game should be played by people 14 years or older because it includes connecting with real people in the game, crude language, and a certain level of violence. However, it should be noted there is little to no gore. ics, but

Shadowlands has an excellent leveling experience, with the maximum level being 60. There are several races and classes to choose from, such as an Orc Hunter, for example. There are activities in the game called dungeons, raids, and player versus player, or PVP for short. Dungeons feature the act of queueing up with a group of four other players; you try to succeed at defeating all bosses in the dungeon, which usually amount to five or more. Also, there is a potential to gain loot to get better gear, mounts to ride on, or bags to carry more in-game goods. Raids are like dungeons, with almost the same concept, except you are in a group with 39 other players to compete for loot. Raids have special features such as legendary equipment, the highest rating of gear in the game. Player versus player is usually 10 or 15 real players against another group of 10 or 15 total players. The most common modes are capture the flag where you have to get the enemy team's flag and bring

it back to your base, and domination, where there are three bases to capture. The more bases, the more points you get.

Another thing to note is that the graphics are immaculate with the immersive armors and the number of details they put into the gear sets, the textures such as the trees, grass, or even water. You can tell that they care about the game's performance from the effort they put into it. The details pro-

gressed so far over the years. The first expansion had poor graphics, but they really put up all production costs.

Also, the questing experience is really good, with over 10,000 of them to complete. The game has a lot of things to do when you are bored.

You can

mindlessly sit back and do a quest for a short while and collect experience points to level up your character from 1 to 60. Even when you reach level 60, you can still do a lot of daily quests that reset every day so you can redo them when you complete them for the day. The many quests give you experience points to level up your character, armor and weapons to give your character better gear, and also give reputation points with a faction to increase your notability with

them, which gives even more rewards when you increase your reputation with a faction. These rewards include: tabards of the faction or city's insignia, mounts to ride on to get to places faster, and special gear to get the character stronger.

The experience I had when playing the game was amazing. The game really appreciates the player base. The company, Blizzard Entertainment, gives attention to the people who play. They mouse. You may also look into the settings, which are easy to navigate, and make the game the way you want to play. There are many keybinds to select, which are just keys you can change to make it the way you want. For example, if you do not like the button "B" to open your bags, you can change it to the key "I" for inventory.

The reason the game is meant for people 14 years and older is that you are playing with actual people

from around the world, and typically parents do not want their 8-year-old child connecting with some 40-yearold man from Europe. Also, people type what they want. The game itself might just say mild cuss words, but people playing usually do not censor themselves for some random person they don't even know.

It is much better to play with many people, as



There is a downside to playing this game, and it is the price. It being \$12.99 a month is utterly ridiculous, but I would say it is definitely worth the price. The game is costly, so keep that in mind as you are thinking about playing; you can play for free, but the game only allows you to play until level 20, which is sort of low compared to the max level of 60. The price is the worst part of the game but if you are willing to play the game and pay the \$12.99, it is worth it.

The overall review I would give World of Warcraft: Shadowlands, published by Blizzard Entertainment, would definitely be an 8.5. This game is absolutely great.
