

2024 Presidential Election intensifies as more candidates announce

As America braces for another election cycle, there are many questions about the candidates whose names could appear on the ballot box.

Once a student turns eighteen, he or she, by law, is given the right to vote. However, it is important to know the policy positions of the eligible candidates to make an informed decision on election day.

As of this moment, there are only three democrats who have confirmed they are running. On the other hand, six republicans have already announced a candidacy, with many more expected to join the race in the coming months.

Democrats:

President Joe Biden (80)/ **Vice President Kamala Harris** (58): On April 25, 2023, President Joe Biden announced that he and Vice President Kamala Harris will be running for re-election.

Biden and Harris frequently discuss the biggest issues for their administration. Their top focus points include working for economic progress, fighting for more clean energy, and attempting to advance the reproductive rights of women.

On the topic of Economic Progress, the Biden Harris Administration hopes to reduce the Economic Deficit, lower healthcare premiums for families that have Obamacare, and raise taxes on billionaires. To help with Clean Energy, Biden credits the tax provisions in the Inflation Reduction Act to help families with the high cost of electric vehicles.

Harris has made Reproductive Rights one of her main issues as Vice President. Harris frequently travels the country to speak in favor of abortion access. During an interview with CBS News, she called for a pro-choice Congress. Biden and Harris hope that a prochoice Congress would protect

access to abortion on a federal level. This issue became a focus point for the administration when the Supreme Court voted to overturn Roe v. Wade last summer.

Marianne Williamson (70): Marianne Williamson, an author and spiritual adviser, recently confirmed that she will indeed attempt to primary Biden and Harris. This means that Williamson hopes that she and her pick for Vice President are on the ballot for the Democratic Party instead of Biden and Harris.

Wiliamson wants to create the United States Department of Children and Youth, as well as the United States Department of Peace. She also hopes to make all colleges tuition-free, remove all student debt, adopt universal healthcare, expand Social Security, and create a Universal Basic Income (UBI). A UBI is when each household receives a certain amount of money from the federal government every year, no matter the work status of adults living in the home.

Williamson would also like to reverse climate change. She hopes that all of these policy plans can ultimately get her across the finish line to beat Biden in the Democratic Primary. This will be an uphill battle for her, as Biden is the incumbent President.

Robert F. Kennedy Jr. (69): Robert F. Kennedy Jr. is the son of former United States Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy and nephew of former President John F. Kennedy. He has recently made headlines by being a harsh critic of President Biden. Although they are both democrats, Kennedy Jr. wants to take the United States in a different direction.

Kennedy Jr. has built his presidential platform on ending censorship and political divide. He wants to end the surveillance of Americans, as well as reduce the rate of

incarceration. If he becomes president, Kennedy Jr. wants to transition to clean energy platforms and reverse policies that he says have led to the decline of the American economy. Kennedy Jr. also pledged to end American involvement in all foreign wars and con-

One issue for the Kennedy Jr. campaign has been his anti-vaccine past. He has received condemnation from many Americans, including two of his siblings and late niece, in an editorial that appeared in Politico. Public health officials have repeatedly condemned his remarks. This issue will be tough for Kennedy Jr. to overcome, as many democrats favor vaccine mandates.

Republicans:

Donald Trump (76): The 45th President of the United States announced that he will, once again, seek another term as President. Constitutionally, he is allowed to do this. However, if he does win the 2024 presidential election, he would not be allowed to run for President again.

Trump wants to change the current economic policy. If he wins again, he will attempt to return to the economic policies during his administration. He also frequently touts record-low unemployment for minority groups. Trump wants to fight for energy independence, and has condemned the Biden Harris Administration for relying on energy abroad.

The former President also hopes to change the current border policy. If elected, he will reinstate the policies he put into place during his first tenure as President. Overall, even with the legal battle he is currently facing, his campaign message is pretty simple: if he is re-elected, he will focus on what he did during his first time as president.

Nikki Haley (51): Nimarata

Nikki Haley announced on February 14th that she is running for the Republican nomination. She is the former Governor of South Carolina and United States Ambassador to the United Nations. If she becomes president, one of her biggest priorities will be to cut billions of dollars to countries that she says are our enemy. Haley also wants to pass term limits for Congress, which will limit the amount of time a person can serve in office.

If elected President, Haley would also attempt to pass a policy that will mandate mental competency tests for politicians over the age of 75. Part of her campaign is attempting to show the American people that the next generation of leadership is needed to lead the country, rather than the politicians who have been there for a prolonged period of

Vivek Ramaswamy (37): On February 21, Vivek Ramaswamy confirmed he will be seeking the Republican nomination for President. Ramaswamy is only 37 years old, making him the youngest candidate to declare so far.

Before running for President, Ramaswamy ran a biotech company that developed different medicines. He holds a bachelor's degree from Harvard and a law degree from Yale. If Ramaswamy were to become President, he wants to focus on merit, rather than identity.

One of the biggest priorities of his campaign has been focused on defeating China. Ramaswamy sees the communist nation as an enemy, and wants the United States to remain the top country in the world in terms of economics.

Larry Elder (71): Larry Elder recently announced that he will be seeking the Republican nomination for President. Elder is a longtime attorney and radio personality, primarily based in California.

Elder previously ran for office, failing to become the Governor of California in the recall election of Governor Gavin Newsom. His platform for President is similar to his Gubernatorial platform. He wants to focus primarily on public safety, school choice, and curbing inflation. An unexpected candidate, Elder will have plenty of work to complete and money to raise if he plans on staying in the race.

Asa Hutchinson (72): Asa Hutchinson recently began his campaign for President of the United States. He has an arguably impressive resume and achieved a national profile through his previous government roles, such as serving as a Congressman for Arkansas' 3rd District, the Administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and as the Governor of Arkansas.

Hutchinson's policies are more reflective of former republican President George W. Bush, rather than former President Trump. Republican voters will have to make a choice about which policies will be the future of the GOP.

Perry Johnson (75): Perry Johnson is arguably the biggest long-shot in the race for either party.

Johnson's biggest campaign promise is to cut the federal budget by two percent every year as President.

Johnson's campaign has struggled, likely due to his scandalous political past. According to ABC News, when he attempted to run for Michigan Governor, he was removed from the ballot for submitting nearly 10,000 fraudulent campaign signatures.

Once any candidate makes their run official, they will begin to travel the country and fundraise. From there, it will be the American people's decision who will represent them the best in the White House.


